



Midweek Lenten Series: You Shall Love the Lord Your God

In Mark 12, a scribe comes to ask Jesus, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answers, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mark 12:28-30). Jesus responds to the scribe's question with words from Deuteronomy that are recited daily



by many of the Jewish faith. In our Midweek Lenten reflections, we will focus on these words which form a covenant between God and God's people. Each week we will explore one of these ways (with heart, soul, mind, and strength) to respond to this God who so extravagantly loves us through the cross.

Midweek services are from 7:00 -7:30pm February 17 and 24, and March 2, 9, and 16. Before worship, please join us for a meal that starts at 6:15pm.

Spiritual Formation Retreat

Christianity is experiencing a spiritual revolution! Lost, ancient forms of prayer which used to be common in the church are now being rediscovered. One example is Centering Prayer. Centering Prayer is a way of cultivating a deeper relationship with God, a way to quiet the mind while maintaining its alertness. It is a path of transformation, a deepening of faith

in God's abiding presence. Centering Prayer is resting in God beyond thoughts, words, and emotions.

milk from a goat provides daily nutrition for families, and the goat's offspring can rapidly transform a community when offspring are shared with other families in need.

St. Paul's Mission Team has chosen to purchase several goats from ELCA Good Gifts this year, and the Trust Fund will add funds to purchase even more goats.

Table Service

A free meal, time of prayer, and opportunities to serve and be served are what is offered weekly at Shobi's Table-a food truck that serves homeless and near-homeless residents of St. Paul, MN.

Pr. Margaret Mary Kelley and Noah have both been there from the beginning. Noah, once homeless in the Twin Cities, was keenly aware of the limited dietary options for those living on extreme margins. Together, they worked to find a solution.

Their solution came in the form of a food truck-a vehicle that allows them to serve freshly prepared meals and bring food to the community at a location that is a natural gathering place for many. Pr. Margaret and Noah have been able to serve around 75-100 neighbors a week since 2014.



"When the church does communi-

ty well, we do it well," shared Pr. Margaret. "We come around the table to gather for lunch and God's meal; people need a lot of both."

What is Shobi's Table's hope for the future? To acquire a bus that would offer indoor and outdoor seating to protect their patrons from the cold Minnesota winter months and to expand their offerings to include vocational training. Each plan is designed to lead them one step closer to accomplishing their mission-to provide food, friendship, faith, and employment skills to the homeless and nearhomeless people of St. Paul.
